

Your Confirmation

“Certainly, if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.”

Romans 10:9 EHV

Just a few weeks ago, we had the privilege to witness four of our youth publically confess their faith in the Rite of Confirmation. It is a joyous occasion to see the next generation growing in their faith and proclaiming their faith in the Savior. Can you remember your own confirmation? Just how long ago was it that you were confirmed?

That question isn't intended to make you feel old even if it's been a few years since you were in 8th grade (or whenever you may have been confirmed). It is intended to make you think about what confirmation really is. If you aren't a long term member of Eternal Shepherd and you've joined the church in recent years (or even if you are merely paying close attention while others are joining), you may have noticed that the Rite of Confirmation sounds surprisingly just like the Rite of New Member Recognition. The content of the questions and answers is essentially the same: confessing the triune God, holding the bible as the inspired Word of God, renouncing the devil and all his works and ways, etc.

And all these things confessed in both rites (the creed, keeping God first, faithful Christian living) are those very topics addressed in the Small Catechism. A book which, if we are following Luther's advice, we are reviewing regularly or even reading portions on a daily basis. In fact, before reading a daily portion of the catechism or bible, Luther also advises that we “make the sign of the cross and say: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.” This is a way to remember each day who we are. A way to be marked again by the One who saved us from all sin and the power of death. It is a way to confess our faith to ourselves, to reject again Satan and his ways, and to confess before the world that we are children of a Heavenly Father for the sake of our Savior Jesus Christ.

So, when were you last confirmed in the faith? It isn't a one-time event. Make the sign of the cross or recite the creed or dust off that old Small Catechism, because right now is a great time to experience Confirmation.

The Board Of Christian Outreach (BOCO) will be working with a new ministry this summer. The United Way of Oconee County started a Summer Read and Feed Program to help families who need a safe place for their Elementary School Age Children, a place where they can go to have fun, keep up with their reading skills and have a hot lunch. The program was awarded a USDA Grant and the local high school kitchen prepares the lunch. Last summer they had 11 children ages 4-11 and 4 volunteer college counselors.

The United Way offices have changed location and can no longer have the children in their area. Eternal Shepherd has been asked to use the downstairs level, which is no longer used for a Summer Preschool Program.

Council has approved the use of the building and the Board of Christian Outreach will be the responsible contact. Duke Power is another major sponsor.

ESLC will have the honor of hosting the program at the following times:

Mon.-Fri. (9:00 AM – 2:00 PM) from June 11 – July 27

Pastor will have a Chapel time once a week and we are looking into other ways that we can volunteer. Please watch for future announcements in the bulletin and let me know if you are interested in helping. As the ESLC coordinator, I will be happy to address any questions, concerns or suggestions.

Please pray that we may be a blessing to these families in our community. LaShauna Harrison, CEO of United Way of Oconee stated in the Journal: "When we're making better children and the children are making us better, it makes for a better community."

Thank you for praying for the children of our community. Thanks also for being a haven for children who would have been at risk of being 'latch key' over the summer while their parents worked.

Deaconess Musings

I am... Confessional & Creedal

*Why does the Creed begin with the words “I believe”?**

The English word creed comes from the Latin word *credo* – “I believe.” A creed is a statement of faith, a statement of what I believe. To say “I believe” is to say what God has done *for me*. “I am convinced that God has made *me*, redeemed *me*, and sanctified *me*.”

We all believe in one true God, who created earth and heaven, the Father, who to us in love has the right of children given. He in soul and body feeds us; all we need His hand provides us; through all snares and perils leads us, watching that no harm betide us. He cares for us by day and night; all things are governed by His might.

– *We All Believe in One True God, LSB 954:1*

*What distinguishes the Father, Son, and Spirit from one another?**

A. In their relationship to one another, they are distinguished by their interactions with one another. The Father *begets* the Son from eternity; the Son is *begotten* of the Father from all eternity; the Holy Spirit from eternity *proceeds* from the Father and the Son.

We all believe in Jesus Christ, His own Son, our Lord, possessing an equal God-head, throne, and might, source of ev’ry grace and blessing; born of Mary, virgin mother, by the power of the Spirit, Word made flesh, our elder brother; that the lost might life inherit, was crucified for all our sin and raised by God to life again. – LSB 954:2

B. In their relationship to us, they are distinguished by their works for us. The Scriptures ordinarily speak of the Father as *creating* us, the Son *redeeming* us, and the Holy Spirit *sanctifying* us.

We all confess the Holy Ghost, who, in highest heaven dwelling with God the Father and the Son, comforts us beyond all telling; who the Church, His own creation, keeps in unity of spirit. Here forgiveness and salvation daily come through Jesus’ merit. All flesh shall rise, and we shall be in bliss with God eternally. – LSB 954:3

*What unites the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit as one God?**

A. In their relationship to one another, the three persons find their unity as one divine being called God. The Father, Son, and Spirit are alike almighty, alike Creator, alike Redeemer.

B. In their relationship to us, the three persons find their unity in the Father as both the source and goal of their work. Out of love, the Father sends the Son, and together they send the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit brings us to Christ, who in turn shows us the Father’s love.

I bind unto myself today the strong name of the Trinity by invocation of the same, the Three in One and One in Three. Of whom all nature has creation, Eternal Father, Spirit, Word. Praise to the Lord of my salvation; Salvation is of Christ the Lord!

ON-LINE GIVING

Because of the hard work and attention to detail of Grover Stewart, Financial Secretary and Cindy Gibson, our Web Site Manager, Eternal Shepherd members now have the ability to make their financial gifts on-line.

The congregation has now begun contributing to Eternal Shepherd using our on-line giving application. To contribute on-line go to the church's web site and click on the blue button in the upper right corner and follow the instructions and prompts. You will be asked if you are making a one-time donation or if you desire to establish an account. You will be able to choose the type of donation i.e. one-time or recurring. Then you can indicate the fund you wish to give to either the general fund or a particular designated fund. Note, initially, the designated funds are limited to the largest funds. Also, you will be prompted to select the method of payment: checking account, savings account, etc. Once you complete and submit the transaction, you will be able to print a detailed receipt. The church will receive a confirmation of the donation and later a deposit report.

After establishing an account, if you have the QR App on a device, you can use this method to contribute each Sunday using the QR code printed in the Sunday bulletin or the monthly Agapegram.

There were over 300 people in attendance consisting of pastoral and lay delegates, as well as advisors and observers. Two and a half days of voting on resolutions, speaker presentations and church services made for a very busy but productive time. I thoroughly enjoyed hearing Synod President Matthew Harrison speak. At one point during his talk, he laid down on the stage when he was recalling the Bible story of Jesus calling Lazarus out of the tomb where he demonstrated that we can do nothing to save ourselves and Jesus does it all. It was a perfect object lesson!

There were many organizations in the exhibit hall who shared information about their ministries including Lutheran Church Charities Comfort Dog, Sasha. Needless to say, Kyra spent a lot of time with Sasha and her handler's Phil and Brenda! Several other exhibits were ministries working toward spreading the Gospel in various ways. The sharing of common concerns and networking with like minded people struggling to address problems within their congregations and their communities made me feel apart of the wider church and very proud of what is being done to help with these problems. I hope to share some of this knowledge with council as it directly relates to us here at ESLC. There was one concept that I found very interesting, one that I had never thought about but believe is the work of the Holy Spirit. Jesus tells us in the great commission to go forth to all the nations baptizing and making disciples. I have always found it difficult to imagine traveling all over the world to share this message, but what has been happening in recent years is the world has been coming to America in the form of immigrants. These people in most cases are hungry for the word of God but need help getting a worship community functioning. There were many groups represented at the convention that were tackling this challenge and coming along side these fledging congregations to offer assistance in a variety of ways. We could contact these groups if this was something we felt moved to learn more about.

As many church activities wind down for the summer I would like to take this opportunity to thank our Preschool director Gina Cote and the preschool staff for all their hard work throughout the year. I also want to thank Rick Schmidt, Michelle Rowland and the choir for their hard work, their commitment of time and their wonderful voices. When the Lord of Heaven Calls

Matthew 20:26-28; Romans 12:1-2; Psalm 84

Some people are slow learners. I know, because in at least one area I am one of them. After entering the military intelligence career field in 1971, I tried not one, not two, not even three, but *four* times to leave a profession to which I am now fully convinced God had called me. All four attempts to go into “full time ministry” were unsuccessful, some quickly and some slowly, but all were off the path of service God had chosen for me. At the end of each failed attempt to exert my will over my service, a door opened for greater responsibility, service and growth in the field to which God had first directed me. Looking back on those struggles, the words of Jesus’ admonition to Saul in *Acts 26:14* often echo in my heart, “(Kerry, Kerry), it’s hard for you to kick at the goads,” and I am filled anew with a joyful desire to render my service in the place and manner to which He calls me. So I may be slow, but ultimately I do learn.

As the Israelites began to be caught up in the business of making a new home, a new community, and a new nation, Joshua was inspired to remind all Israel—man, woman, and child—that God expects and deserves our love, our obedience, and our service. He reminded them that it is God we are to serve in all that we do. But Joshua also wisely noted that we—individually and corporately—must choose to accept or reject that call to service. (*Joshua 22:5 and 24:15*) So it is for each of us today. We, too, must make that choice—that daily choice—to say yes to the Lord’s gentle yet bracing call, “Take up your cross and follow Me.”

The Master, in His role as Servant King, often demonstrated to those who followed Him most closely that their destinies, like His, were to be servants, both to the body of Christ that He would establish and to those who did not yet know Him. (*Matthew 21:25-28*) Some would be prophets, some elders, some missionaries and some evangelists, but each without exception would be called to service, several at the cost of their lives. Some would be called to serve in Jerusalem, some in Antioch, some in Rome, others in various cities of the known world, and yet others to the “very ends of the earth.” Though we sometimes ignore the fact, our call to service is not really all that different than that of the apostles: the Master calls, and we must answer.

Have you prayerfully considered where and to what service you have been called? Is it teaching? Administration? Leadership? Singing? Hospitality? Prayer? Loading trucks? Pouring coffee or concrete? Feeding the hungry? Encouraging the hurting? Caring for the sick? Or perhaps you, like this slow learner, believe you are called vocationally as well. Whatever He gives you to do, do it with your might, as unto the Lord, and let Him fill you with the joy that comes from serving Him with all your heart and mind and soul and strength.

Holy Father, by Your loving grace You call me to service. Knowing what I can do, You place opportunities to honor and serve You in front of me, yet how it must grieve You when I close my eyes and heart to them. Forgive my blindness, Lord, and open my eyes, open my heart, and strengthen my hands for the tasks to which You are calling me. I pray by the power of Jesus’ name that You would fill me with joy through my service to You, my Rock and my Redeemer.

Alaska Missions 2018

Hello everybody! I wanted to give you all an update on the status of the 2018 Alaska mission trip to Chevak. **The trip has been planned for June 21st – July 2nd** with a total of six team members from Eternal Shepherd: Madison Ranalli, Katie Baumann, Sara Baumann, Jonathan Pitts, Marisha Bishop, and Frank Kieninger. Those who are returning are excited for the opportunity to serve in Chevak once again and reunite with old friends, and those whom this is their first time are looking forward to this new opportunity to spread the good news of Jesus Christ! I can say from experience that Chevak will touch their hearts.

This year, the team will take a total of four flights to reach Chevak, leaving from Greenville/Spartanburg Airport at 11:00am on June 21st. The itinerary leads the team to a layover in Chicago, then arriving in Anchorage at 7:30 pm. The team will then have to take two more planes to get to Chevak on Friday, the 22nd. After VBS has completed and the team is returning home, they will then take another four flights, returning to GSP at 10:49 on July 2nd.


DETENTION CENTER OUTREACH MINISTRY:

God can do great things with our gifts. This craft reminds us that every little coin counts. When your lamb is full, empty out the coins and give them to a charity or church mission program.




What you need:

- Knit glove (black or white)
- 1-foot-long piece of thin ribbon, any color
- Stapler
- Craft glue or hot glue gun
- Fiberfill or cotton balls
- 2 googly eyes

What you do:

1. Staple one end of the ribbon to the inside of each side of the glove's opening to make a hanger.
2. For the lamb's body, cover the palm and half of the thumb with glue. Stick the fiberfill or cotton balls onto the glue.
3. Glue a googly eye to each side of the mitten's thumb. (The other fingers will be the legs.)
4. Hang the lamb where you'll see it often. Whenever you have extra change, drop it into your lamb bag.
