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Abba Father



God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts to shout, “Abba, Father!”

Galatians 4:6 EHV

[Based on Sunday’s Epistle reading, a blog from Rev. Shane Lem:]

[Despite what we have often heard and repeated,] It isn’t quite right to say that the Aramaic “abba” means “daddy.” In other words, to call the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob “daddy” at the outset of our prayers is a bit too casual and irreverent...

[Eugene Peterson writes,] “... *The German scholar Joachim Jeremias...*

tried to provide a fresh appreciation of the childlike spontaneity conveyed by ‘Abba.’ Jeremias tried to make a case for ‘Abba’ meaning something on the order of “Daddy.” His suggestion was welcomed with enthusiasm by many. The cozy informality of the term found itself used in sermons and teachings everywhere. It was made to order... for a culture that was uneasy with authority, was anti-hierarchical, and wanted to be on a first-name, even nickname basis with everyone. And now God.”

“Then the Oxford scholar James Barr threw cold water on what he discerned was nothing more than sentimentalizing coziness. He convincingly demonstrated that Jeremias was embarrassingly mistaken. But by then it was too late. The horse was out of the barn. The mistake, coziness displacing holiness, keeps showing up in both scholarly and popular writing.”

Philip Ryken explains.

“To call God ‘Abba, Father’ is to speak to him with reverence as well as confidence. Abba does not mean ‘Daddy.’ ... What Barr discovered was that abba was not merely a word used by young children. It was also the word that Jewish children used for their parents after they were fully grown. Abba was a mature, yet affectionate way for adults to speak to their fathers.”

“The New Testament is careful not to be too casual in the way it addresses God. The Aramaic word abba appears three times in the New Testament (Mark 14:36; Rom. 8:15; Gal. 4:6). In each case it is followed immediately by the Greek word pater. Pater is not the Greek word for ‘Daddy.’ The Greek language has a word for ‘Daddy’ – the word pappas – but that is not the word the New Testament uses to translate abba. Instead, in order to make sure that our intimacy with God does not become an excuse for immaturity, it says, ‘abba, pater.’”

“The best way to translate abba is “Dear Father,” or even “Dearest Father.” That phrase captures both the warm confidence and the deep reverence that we have for our Father in heaven. It expresses our intimacy with God, while preserving his dignity. When we pray, therefore, we are to say, ‘Our dear Father in heaven.’”

“See the kind of love the Father has given us that we should be called children of God, and that is what we are!” 1 John 3:1 EHV

Lutheran Churches and Schools Continue to Grow in Haiti.

Samuel and Louitene Accilien distribute more Bibles and Luther's Small Catechism. Louitene is the principle of the Pas Bonbon school started by ESLC last year.

Pastor Walta sent the following update last month:

Our churches and schools are growing in Central-Plateau. God is good! We thank God. We thank Brother Lars and Sister Wendy from churches in NC/SC USA for all their blessings.

In fact, Pas Bonbon will have more and more students. Pas Bonbon will be double or triple. We will be glad to talk to you about this situation when we will be together. Example: Many children will come from a preaching station that we have in Savane Haleine. There is no preschool for them in this area. I have 2 choices:

- 1) Start a preschool for them in Savane Haleine;*
- 2) Send all children to Pas Bonbon.*

I do not have the capability to start the preschool for 200 children in Savane Haleine because we have no payroll for teachers yet (3000 USD for the year). We have the land. The parents have wood to build. I study the possibility to send them to Pas Bonbon. That would be great but they will have to cross 4 rivers daily on foot. When it rains they will have to stay home. Problems! We have many other children who would come to us.

Pastor Walta also noted that Rocky Road Lutheran Church has 200 children. We at ESLC will be working toward another school startup in the near future.

Monotonously Beautiful Living

*Wake up. Feed the cat. Drink a cup (or three) of coffee. Do morning devotions. Get ready for the day. Drive to work. Drive home. Pet the cat. Eat dinner. Do a load of laundry. Call parents. Watch an hour or two of TV. Go to sleep. *Repeat indefinitely. Enact variations for vacations and Sunday mornings.*

"For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." Mark 10:45



A Place among the Heroes

What qualities do you think of when you hear the word “hero?” Several years ago, the church I was attending had a Wednesday evening study on heroes, and that question was asked. In the ensuing discussion, some of the qualities of heroes mentioned were “larger than life,” “able to handle any situation,” “good looking,” “perfect judgment,” “unafraid,” and—perhaps most importantly—“always ready with a good comeback for every slight or insult.” I’ve thought about that discussion over the years whenever the subject of heroes comes up, and I’ve begun to realize that none of the heroes in my life fit those particular patterns.

Christians have “gold standard” examples of heroes in the Bible, of course, like Daniel and David and even the young boy who warned the Apostle Paul of a plot on his life. Consequently, some define heroes as ordinary people doing extraordinary things under extraordinary circumstances. But I’d like to suggest a somewhat different view of heroes: my heroes are just committed people doing the right thing in whatever circumstance they find themselves. If we use the second definition, we will find that heroes surround us in the body of Christ. And they can teach us, lead us, and inspire us if we’ll let them. They are those who:

Allow love and joy to radiate in their lives even when under the difficult daily commitment of caring for an incapacitated or dying loved one.

Refuse to dwell on their own pain and challenges and focus instead on being quiet and persistent encouragers of others.

Take on the hard and thankless jobs, knowing that they will spend their time and love and energy over and over without receiving a word of thanks, not caring that it is so.

Make a commitment every day to love, care for, support, and be kind and faithful to their spouse until death parts them for a little while.

Invest their time, labor and tears in molding, teaching and training children so their hearts and minds will be prepared to serve the Master and those He loves.

Bear the scorn of the popular crowd at school and are unafraid to wear the name of Jesus as a badge of honor wherever they go.

Our great Teacher once said, “The one who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted.” If we humble ourselves and find a place to serve, we will also find a place where we will be a hero to someone, even though we don’t seek that status. And that’s all right with God; He sent His Son to show us what real heroes do. It turns out that they do “servant things.” And He asks us—personally and individually—to be the salt and light of the earth. He asks us to be personal, daily examples of what The Word calls men and women to be and to say and to do through the power of the Holy Spirit dwelling within them.

We often hear that this world needs more heroes. But it seems to me we need heroes who fit the second definition. And that’s where you and I come in. Our families, our communities, our churches, and our nation are longing for each of us to take our place among the heroes.

Fathers, be heroes to your children in the gentle, loving way you treat their mother.
Mothers, be heroes to your children in the respectful, loving way you treat their dad.
Supervisors, be heroes to your employees by the fair, kind, compassionate and consistent way you treat every person under your authority.

Students, be heroes to the student in the class behind you who is struggling with the temptation to follow the crowd where Jesus would not go.

Brothers in Christ, be heroes to your brothers and sisters in the way you persevere in walking the narrow way instead of the broad one.

Sisters in Christ, be heroes to your brothers and sisters in the way you show the love of Christ impartially to all who have a need for help and comfort.

Pastors and teachers, be heroes to the body of Christ and to those captive to sin by the way you proclaim the whole counsel of God with boldness and love.

When I was a boy, I watched *The Lone Ranger* every Saturday morning. I vividly remember saying to myself, "I want to be just like him." Now I read the Gospels and find my heart saying, "I want to be just like *Him*." So as God grants me His grace and power through the Holy Spirit, I'm going to try to pattern the way I think and act and serve and love the way He showed me. I admit I'm still not very good at it. But however slow my transformation, I am convinced that He intends for each of us to take our place among the heroes. And look! The heroes of faith who have gone before us are cheering us on! Take up the towel of service, take up the sword of the Spirit, and take your place among the heroes.

Operation Christmas Child “Christmas In July” Fundraiser

In 2018, Samaritan’s Purse sent out 10,623,776 shoeboxes through Operation Christmas Child to 112 countries (plus 24 hard-to-reach countries not named for security reasons)! And every child that received a box also received the Gospel. Ten years ago, Samaritan’s Purse launched a follow-up discipleship program called “The Greatest Journey”. It’s a 12 lesson series that churches use to teach Bible stories, memorize Scripture and become soul-winners in their communities. We praise God that nearly 9 million boys and girls in 124 countries have made decisions for Christ through “The Greatest Journey.” Here’s a look at the success of this program by the numbers:



920,418 volunteer teachers trained worldwide

8.9 million decisions for Christ

9.7 children sharing the gospel

This year more than 4 million children worldwide are enrolled in “The Greatest Journey.” Samaritan’s Purse provides graduates with a diploma and a copy of the New Testament in their local language, to help them continue to grow in their faith and share the Gospel with others. **Talk about changing the world one heart at a time!!**

God is doing amazing things through this ministry, and Eternal Shepherd is blessed to be a part of that blessing. Our annual fund raiser for our packing party takes place this month during our “Christmas in July” month long campaign. Our goal is to raise \$3,800.00. Of that amount, \$1,800.00 will be used to cover shipping costs.


MAKE A "SUMMER ADVENTURE" JOURNAL

If you take a vacation trip this summer, make a book to record all the places you visit or the places you'd like to visit someday.




Here's what you need:

- 5-10 sheets of white paper
- 1 sheet of heavy construction paper
- paper punch
- ribbon or raffia
- pen and/or markers



Here's how to make your journal:

1. Fold the construction paper in half. This will be the cover.
2. Stack the white paper, fold it in half and place it inside the cover. Trim the edges if they stick out.
3. Use the paper punch to punch 2 or 3 holes through all the paper (including the cover) near the folded edge. (You may be able to punch only a few sheets of paper at a time. In that case, use a pen to mark where the holes should be, so they will all line up.)
4. Pull the ribbon or raffia through the holes to hold the pages together, and then tie a bow.
5. Decorate the cover.
6. Fill in the pages with notes, pictures and memories about your trip.
