

Lutheran Worship, Part II: *The Pattern of the Divine Service*

Come, let us sing joyfully to the LORD. Let us give a loud shout to the Rock who saves us. Ps. 95:1 EHV

We continue to reflect on what worship is about, again drawing from past LCMS President, Rev. Dr. A.L. Barry's *What About* series:

What is the basic pattern or “rhythm” of Lutheran worship?

Here is how our [previous] hymnal *Lutheran Worship* describes it: Our Lord speaks and we listen. His Word bestows what it says. Faith that is born from what is heard acknowledges the gifts received with eager thankfulness and praise. ... Saying back to Him what He has said to us, we repeat what is most true and sure. ... The rhythm of our worship is from Him to us, and then from us back to Him. He gives His gifts, and together we receive and extol them. We build one another up as we speak to one another in psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs.

What does “Divine Service” mean?

Historically, the phrase used to describe Lutheran worship is Divine Service. This helps us understand the rhythm of worship—that it is first and foremost God serving us with His gifts, and then our service to Almighty God in thanksgiving and praise for all He has done. This rhythm of God giving His gifts and our giving Him thanks is conveyed aptly in the term, Divine Service.

The Divine Service is a “holy” time, meaning a time “set apart.” It is a time to be set apart from the workaday world—a time to spend with our Lord. Indeed, in the Divine Service we are gathered together in the presence of the holy, almighty, ever-living God, and thus we are part of a time of “heaven on earth,” as our Lord forgives our sins and gives us new life today, and eternal salvation with Him forever. This understanding of the Divine Service explains why many who experience Lutheran worship for the first time describe it as dignified, reverent, and sacred.

Let us approach his presence with thanksgiving... For the LORD is the great God... Ps. 95:2-3a EHV

God's Blessing of Family

I grew up as one of nine children in our family. As a kid it was all I knew and I presumed it was a family like any other family in Iowa or anywhere else for that matter. Sure we had our moments. Fighting with brothers, tormenting sisters, occasionally disappointing parents, sometimes even being disobedient. My parents worked hard and with eleven mouths to feed we always had enough to eat. We had to watch our pennies so we had to go without certain extras. One thing I am very thankful for is that my parents stressed the importance of family and the importance of prayer. We were taught to love each other no matter what and watch out for one another.

Growing up in a small Iowa town of 200 people sheltered us. Everyone knew everyone else. We all had a similar value system and knew what was right and what was not right. My parents always seemed to find out if we were to deviate from doing the right thing. The parents of other families had our best interest in mind too.

I could not wait until I was able to leave this sleepy little berg and go out on my own. As I found myself in more diverse environments and got to know people with different family dynamics I became aware that many families were not like mine. Jealousy and mistrust in those families led to fighting and hostility among family members. Sometimes years had gone by with no contact with other family members.

A few months ago my Mom passed away. In Early July it became time to purge my parents' home of a lifetime of acquisitions. They had lived in this house for 65 years. They had a hard time throwing things away so much had accumulated. My siblings and I were all there to go through all that had accumulated. As we are spread out from California to the Carolinas it is uncommon for all of us to be together at the same time. We cherish these times.

The experience was bitter-sweet. It brought back many memories of growing up in that home. It was wonderful being with my brothers and sisters again determining the disposition of all that stuff that had accumulated. Much of the stuff was discarded. Things that had real or sentimental value were divided up among the siblings. If an item was desired by multiple family members we would draw names out of a hat. The process was orderly and fair and carried out lovingly. I attribute this to the way our parents raised us and the value we all place on family.

One of my sisters is a widow and has no children of her own. She has been battling cancer for over a year and depression. My sisters living near her provided her with loving support. They took her to doctor's appointments and numerous hospital stays and we all provided encouragement to her. We were Christ's hands and feet for her. It has been a challenging 18 months but she is now cancer free and doing much better. Without family she would have been lost.

We have attempted to instill the same attitude about family with our own children. We too are spread out from coast to coast and this makes it difficult to coordinate being together but it is wonderful when it happens. We thank God for the blessing of family.

In no other place is your confidence found. He upholds your faith, strengthens it, and keeps it firm. Do not doubt it. For if Christ, our Creator and Redeemer, promises to keep you, it is done. Finalized over two-thousand years ago across the sea.


Kingdoms will rise and fall. Our feelings will wane and crumble. Christ is forever.

PRAYER SHAWLS ARE AVAILABLE FOR YOU TO GIVE.

If you know someone who would benefit from the gift of a prayer shawl, please do not hesitate to select one for them. There are the full size prayer shawls as well as pocket prayer shawls. The pocket prayer shawls with an embedded cross worked into them are ideal to include in cards or carry in a pocket or purse.

The full size prayer shawls come in many different colors and styles. They may be knitted or crocheted, but the important part is that the crafter prays for the person that will receive the prayer shawl. They may take from 40 to 80 hours to make and are a labor of love. We have received many thank you cards expressing the love the recipients feel when they receive this gift and the comfort that it brings them. When anyone is going through a difficult time, no matter the cause, knowing that someone cares about them lifts their spirit. We want them to feel that God is on their side and will sustain them through whatever they face. As I said earlier, if you are concerned and praying for someone, please feel free to give them a prayer shawl. They may be a family member or a friend; they do not need to be a member to Eternal Shepherd. You do not need any approval to give one, but we do ask that if you give it to them personally, that you pray for and with them as you give it.

The Prayer Shawl Self Service Kiosk is available near the closets in the Fellowship Hall. When you select a full size prayer shawl from one of the three bins, we request that you complete the sign out sheet which should be in the top bin. It simply requests your name, the person you are given it to and the date. There is a list behind the sign out sheet of the people that have already received a prayer shawl. ESLC has given over 100 (full size) prayer shawls since this ministry has begun. If you take a pocket prayer shawl, no sign out is necessary. ~Thank you for sharing, Sue Hauser


The end date/time is flexible. If you want to work only 2-3 days that will be fine. We plan to carpool and stay in a local Lumberton hotel.

Update on Haiti Following the Earthquake



The map shows Haiti. D-16 is the area of the churches and schools we are working with – Pas Bonbon, Rocky Road, and Laotchikit. The earthquake hit in the area not far from H-16. All of those locations indicated are churches, Schools and Preaching Stations working with Pastor Walta and Trinity HOPE feeding program. Fatalities from the disaster had risen to 2,207, with most of the damage in Sud, Nippes and Grand’Anse, which occupy the western portion of the southern peninsula. More than 12,000 people were injured and 344 people were reported missing. We were saddened with the news that the fiancé of one of the young men we met during our visit in January

2019 was killed in the earthquake. Our prayers for all those who lost loved ones, the thousands who were injured and the tremendous loss of property. We are thankful for the news from Pastor Walta that all are well in the Central Plateau and Covid is not an issue.

Quick update on our schools - Pastor Samuel of Pas Bonbon reports many more are registering for school. What a blessing!!!

Honduras News:

Our primary desire is to return to Honduras to serve once again in the near future, but at the present time the situation in the country is not favorable to accomplish this mission. The country is still fully masked and not allowing teams to bring any goods or medicine into Honduras. WGO is presently hosting small teams who join with full time missionaries and staff to distribute food and medicine through the CarePay program which we have supported. The small team ministry is much different from what we have experienced in the past and is not something that has been fully developed and so, at present, the support of CarePay seems the best way to support our friends at World Gospel Outreach in Honduras.

Hopefully as we move into 2022 there will be the opportunity for us to form a Serve Team to be part of the WGO efforts in Tegucigalpa. Additionally WGO continues to maintain the ministry to the cast-off children of Honduras at their mountain community of Rancho Ebenezer. It is there that approximately 50 children are being raised and educated in a bi-lingual setting that will prepare these children to hopefully be future leaders in their country.

If you feel lead to be part of either of these WGO ministries please do so today. Checks can be made to the ESLC Honduras Mission Fund, attention CarePay or WGO Kids. A great part of WGO funding is from the Serve Teams that travel there and without teams the funding is not there. Your contribution will help keep WGO healthy as the country moves out of the Pandemic and hopefully into better times.

Our experiences in Honduras have been life changing for many and we look forward to the time when we can return to serving there. Until then our desire is to assist them in whatever way we can. We hope you will feel lead to join us in supporting the ministries of World Gospel Outreach.

Evangeline and the School Supplies

I grew up on a small island in the Philippines. There were five kids in my family—I'm the second oldest. My sister was born when I was 9. Around that time my father lost his job. After that tragedy, he didn't want to deal with us, and he became an alcoholic and a drug addict. That was also when the government decided to make a dumpsite close to our home, which was made out of cardboard. That dumpsite turned into our livelihood as my mom and older brother would go there to look for things they could sell so they could buy food for us. That's how our rough life began.



When my younger sister was 3, she would sneak out of our house and go to a church at the dumpsite. They were teaching the kids Bible stories, singing songs, and giving food to the children. I thought it was a scam, but God showed me otherwise. One of my neighbors invited me to help cook food for the children. The first or second time I helped, the Pastor introduced Christ to me and a seed was planted in my heart. After that I became really involved with the church. Every Saturday I would help them cook, and read Bible stories to the kids, and I enjoyed it. Around Easter I attended a youth camp where I accepted Jesus into my heart. That was the start of my journey with the Lord and it has been amazing since then.

That December, Samaritan's Purse came to the dumpsite. I was tall for a 13 year-old, so they asked me to help distribute shoebox gifts to the kids. I helped, but every time I handed a shoebox to a child, I would shake it and smell it. Growing up in a dump site you smell smoke and other unpleasant things, but the shoebox gifts smelled so good. I was praying that God would give me one of them. As I was handing out the boxes, the pile was disappearing one by one. The kids just kept coming and coming and I thought, I'm not going to get one. My younger siblings got theirs and waited outside for me to finish. To my surprise, a lady from Samaritan's Purse saved a box for me at the end. When she tapped me on the shoulder and handed it to me, I was amazed. This was the first gift I had ever received. It was precious. It was special. I was 13 and had never received a gift. It was really meant for me! Inside I found school supplies, and my favorite was the pink, glittery notebook that I used that year at school. I remember pretending to be a writer with it. I also got pencils, towels, a toothbrush, and two kinds of fresh-smelling soaps. That was the good scent in the boxes.

I received my shoebox gift the same year I accepted Christ, and it really solidified my relationship with Him. I knew that my life changed when I accepted Jesus into my heart, and I felt that through the shoebox He showed me the void in my heart had been replaced with love. It was a gift from Him. This love from my Heavenly Father meant so much, because it was at this time that my relationship with my dad started to crumble. Since then, I've been able to introduce Christ to many of my family members—to my cousins, to my younger siblings, to my aunts and uncles. But unfortunately, my older brother, my mom, and my dad have not yet received Christ. I still believe that they will come to Him, but I am grateful the rest of the family has accepted Jesus into their hearts.

Now as an adult, I enjoy packing shoeboxes with my husband and two girls from our home in Kansas City, Kansas. A few years ago, we were also able to return to the Philippines to observe one of The Greatest Journey discipleship classes that is offered to shoebox recipients. I felt like I had come full circle watching that class. It just seems like yesterday that I got my shoebox gift, but when I think that each box represents the face of a child, it makes me smile.

Contributions for our July fundraiser brought in \$2,925.00, bringing the year-to-date donations to \$4,335.76! I simply cannot express my gratitude to all of you for your ongoing and continued support of this ministry that God has laid on my heart. Your faithfulness allows me to purchase the items that go into the boxes that end up blessing so many children. Shipping has been paid for 300 boxes. Our packing party will take place on Saturday, November 6th from 2-4:30pm. Please come and be a part of the fun and blessing that is this ministry! For questions, call Terri Baumann @ 882-4386.

“Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.”


Isaiah 41:10

Easy Applesauce Muffins

This healthy recipe will make a great start to your day, a great snack or a great gift for your teacher and classmates.


What you need:

- 6 tablespoons butter
- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 1/2 cups chunky applesauce
- Baking cups



What you do:

1. With an adult's help, heat the oven to 375 degrees. Line a 12-cup muffin tin with baking cups and set aside.
2. In a small, microwave-safe bowl, melt the butter on high for about 30 seconds; set aside to cool slightly.
3. Sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon and salt in to a large mixing bowl.
4. In another large bowl, whisk together the eggs and brown sugar. Stir in the applesauce and melted butter until the mixture is smooth.
5. Pour the apple mixture over the flour mixture. Stir with a wooden spoon just until the flour disappears. (This will produce muffins with a nice, crumbly texture.)
6. Fill the baking cups about two-thirds full with batter. (For mess-free muffins, use an ice-cream scoop to spoon batter into the baking cups.)
7. Bake for 20 minutes or until light brown. Test for doneness by inserting a toothpick in the middle; if it comes out clean, the muffins are ready to eat. Makes 12.
