

Let Lent Linger

...If anyone wants to follow me, let him deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me. Mark 8:34 EHV

We are quickly moving into and through the season of Lent. Lutheran pastor Todd A Peperkorn writes in a 2014 Federalist article entitled *Why Lent Should Matter to Everyone* these words to encourage us to invest ourselves in this season while it lasts:

... Lent (which basically means "spring") is a time when Christians all over the world prepare for Jesus Christ's resurrection of the dead. ... Historically, there are three practices associated with Lent: Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving or works of mercy. It is a time when Christians mourn over their sin (called repentance) and learn again to trust in their Savior, Jesus Christ. Just like you don't only go to a doctor once, in the same way a Christian can benefit from a "checkup" on their faith, to remind them who they are as baptized children of God.

In connection with this, Lent can be a time of great focus for the Christian. Our culture is inundated with input. ...But in order to focus more on one thing, one must also learn to focus less on other things. ... In Christian terms, this is really why we "give up" things for Lent. ... By giving up something that is a regular part of your life (e.g. a kind of food or drink, games, or maybe even Facebook), this allows you to focus more on one thing. For the Christian, that one thing is Jesus Christ, who gave up everything for us, even life itself. So Lent can become a time of beautiful simplicity, hearing again the words of the Bible, and coming to God in repentant joy for what He has done for us.

... It is possible [that] practices such as fasting or prayer or acts of charity might lead to works righteousness, or trying to get to heaven by what we do, rather than by what we believe. If I do these things in order to show off how good a Christian I am, then they really are of no benefit to me or anyone else.

This is why in the historic Gospel reading for Ash Wednesday [Matthew 6], ... Jesus exhorts us not to do these things as a show. There is no room in the Christian faith for works righteousness. But Jesus does assume that the Christian will be doing these things.

In my experience, the greatest danger today lies in rejecting these ancient practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving, because I think I know better than thousands of years of Christian and pre-Christian history.

Easter Crosses


Make this craft to remember what Jesus did for us. Hang it in your room to look at all year long.

What you need:

- Two 8" paper plates (white)
- Scissors
- Pencil
- · Crayons, paints or felt markers
- Stapler, glue stick or glue
- Paper punch
- Yarn, string or ribbon (about 10" or 12")

What you do:


- With your pencil draw a slight curved line all the way across the center of one plate. This will be a hill.
- 2. Draw three crosses on the hill. Make the center one a little bigger than the others.



- 4. Cut out the hill and crosses as one piece.
- Color the top half of the other plate with red, orange and yellow to look like an evening sky.
- 6. Staple or glue the hill-and-crosses plate onto the sky plate. Make sure you line up the bottom edges of the plates, and staple or glue just along the curved edges where the plates meet.
- 7. Punch a hole near the top of the sky plate.
- 8. Tie a loop of yarn, string or ribbon through the hole.
- Hang your scene on your doorknob or on something else in your room.





Seth came to the close-knit community of Seneca, South Carolina, in April 2019. Since then, he's touched many lives.

Becoming a Hometown Hero

When Modern Woodmen member Denise Rozman first met Seth, he was visiting her grandson's preschool.

"When I saw all those smiles, my heart was touched," Denise recalls.

That's why, when her local Modern Woodmen chapter needed to choose their annual Hometown Hero, Seth came to mind. He represents everything a Hometown Hero should be - someone who does outstanding service in the community.

Seth's impact is felt by many. And with his fluffy white coat and comforting presence, it's easy to see how. He visits cancer centers, hospitals, hospice centers, assisted living homes, local schools and more. He has specific individuals he visits regularly, including two veterans in hospice.

Like many heroes, Seth had to go through training before he could help others. This included learning 30 different commands - things like how to be calm, how to approach someone in a hospital and more. He's trained to the level of a service dog, but instead of serving just one person, he serves a whole community.

Claire Muzal, another member of the Seneca Modern Woodmen chapter, is impressed with Seth's work ethic.

"I was surprised by how much he does!" she says. "He works six days a week, around the clock. It really is a full-time job."

Claire has personal experience seeing the impact dogs can have on humans. She previously had a service animal herself and is glad her chapter chose to honor Seth.

"The event was amazing," she says. "It was inspiring to be able to meet all of Seth's different handlers. He's a real sweet dog."

Seth's mission is to provide comfort to those in need. And the work he and his handlers do truly make them Hometown Heroes, Uplifting people's spirits during difficult times ... animal or human that's a true superpower.
